


Guy Fawkes Fact File

"Remember, Remember the 5th of November. Gunpowder, treason and plot..." Guy Fawkes is the name that will forever be associated with Bonfire Night in the UK where we even burn 'Guys' on our bonfires. So who is the man behind Bonfire Night?

Early Life

Guy Fawkes was born in York, probably around 13th of April, 1570 (the date is unknown as there are only records for his christening). His father died when he was eight years old, after which his mother remarried and Guy became a Catholic like his mother had become.

Life before The Gunpowder Plot

When Guy grew up, he became a soldier in the Spanish Army and fought in the Eighty Years War for the Catholic side. This is where he gained the nickname 'Guido', and met Thomas Wintour and an old school friend, Christopher Wright, with whom he would eventually return to England.

The Gunpowder Plot

Led by a man called Robert Catesby, Guy Fawkes was one of thirteen men involved in the Gunpowder Plot. These were Catholic men who wanted rid of King James I, who was not Catholic, so they decided to plan to blow up Parliament when King James I was there. The group rented the cellars underneath the House of Lords (just next door) and there it was that Guy Fawkes was guarding the barrels of gunpowder when he was caught on the 5th of November 1605.

What happened next?

Guy was arrested and found guilty of treason (a crime against the country, or killing of the king or queen). He was sentenced to be hung, drawn and quartered on 31st of January 1606; however, as he was about to face his punishment, he fell and broke his neck, which killed him anyway. The other plotters were also found guilty and sentenced, but Guy Fawkes is the one remembered at Bonfire Night.

Fawkes Facts:

- Guy Fawkes was watching over 36 barrels of gunpowder when he was found. This was enough to blow up the Houses of Parliament as well as a mile-wide area around them.
- There is an island called 'Guy Fawkes' just North of Santa Cruz where nobody lives. No one knows why it was named after him. Was this an escape plan?
- There is still an annual search of the Houses of Parliament before the state opening of Parliament when The Queen visits.

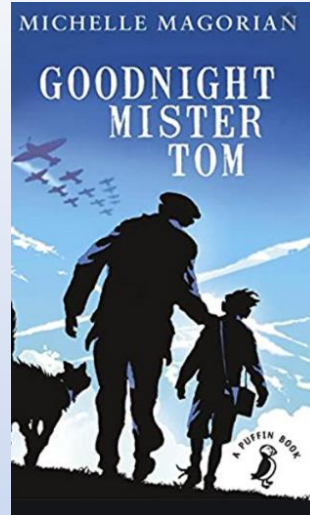
